

### The Liturgy of the Word

#### First Reading: Ephesians 1:15 - end

For thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice. Therefore, thus says the Lord God to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep.

I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the LORD, have spoken.

# The Gospel: Matthew 25:31 - end

'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed

you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'

# Thanks be to God for the Gospel of Christ

This Sunday sees us come to the end of the church year. Traditionally on this Sunday we reflect on Jesus as King. In Matthew's scene of the Last Judgement, Christ is portrayed as a stern King and Judge. But this image shouldn't be overemphasised. Ezekiel has a gentler image — that of a good shepherd, who while caring for all his sheep, shows particular care for the weak and wounded ones. This was the image Christ himself used to describe his person and mission. His followers are required to show that they truly belong to his kingdom by their service to the weak and wounded of society.

I think it is true to say that people's basic material needs have to be taken care of before any kind of higher life is possible. In many countries these needs have been taken care of. So, does this mean that the words of Jesus about feeding the hungry or clothing the naked are no longer relevant? In today's uncertain world, no indeed.

Mother Teresa said this: "The worst disease in the world today is the feeling of being unwanted, and the greatest evil is lack of love. What the poor need even more than food, clothes and shelter, is to be wanted." Hence, the words of Christ are as relevant today more than ever.

In today's context we might re-phrase Jesus' words in Matthew's gospel something like this:

The King will say to those on his left:

Go away from me, I was hungry, not for food but for a smile, and all I got from you were unfriendly looks, all I needed were some words of encouragement but all I got from you was criticism. I just needed a word of appreciation, but you didn't even notice me.

I was thirsty, not for a drink, but for a token of recognition, but all you did was nag and moan at me. I was just looking for friendship but you ignored me. I was thirsty for a little companionship but you couldn't be bothered.

I was a stranger but you refused to have anything to do with me. I was a child but you told your children not to play with me because my clothes were scruffy. I was your next door neighbour but wouldn't allow me into your club because I wasn't quite in your class.

I was naked, not because I didn't have any clothes, but because I lacked selfesteem, and you refused to cover me. I had all my self-confidence stripped away and you made me feel the chill wind of disapproval.

I was sick, not in body, but with doubt and anxiety and you never even noticed. I was wounded by failure and disappointment and you couldn't care less. I was in the depths of depression needing hope and all you did was blame me.

I was a prisoner, not behind bars, but of loneliness and you gave me the cold shoulder. I was a prisoner of guilt, and you could have set me free by forgiving me, but you didn't, you just let me languish there to punish me.

I was homeless, not for want of a home of bricks and mortar, but for the want of tenderness and affection, and you left me out in the cold. I was homeless for want of love and acceptance, and you locked me out of your heart.

Then the King will turn to those on his right and say:

Come, you who have been blessed by my Father.

I was hungry for a smile, and you gave it to me. I was hungry for a word of encouragement, and you praised me. I was hungry for a word of appreciation and you thanked me.

I was thirsty for a word of recognition, and you took notice of me. I was thirsty for a sign of friendship and you telephoned me. I was thirsty for a little companionship, and you went out of your way to stop and chat to me.

I was a stranger, and you made me feel welcome. I was socially inferior to you, but by your acceptance you built me up.

I was naked for want of self-esteem, and you covered me with self-worth. I was stripped of self-confidence, and you dressed me with the cloak of confidence.

I was sick with worry and doubt, and by your cheerful attitude you eased my burden. I was in the depths of depression and by your supportive and patient attitude you gave me hope.

I was a prisoner of loneliness, and by your friendship you released me. I was a prisoner of guilt, and through your forgiveness you broke the chains of guilt. I was homeless for want of tenderness and affection, and you embraced me. I was homeless for want of sympathy and understanding, and you listened to me. The question we must ask ourselves is, how much of the act done to the person in need must be a conscious act done to, or for Jesus, and how much of it is an instinctive action that we undertake in response to need, however and whenever we encounter it.

What the king in the story seems to praise is the instinctive response to human need and not for the act done, or not done, on the basis of whether a person was deserving or not, nor even whether we were doing so consciously as our Christian duty. What matters is our openness to respond compassionately to human need.

There are lots of things we could do if we were more aware and more sensitive. It's not so much a question of giving things, but of giving of ourselves – of our time, our energy and our love. Thus we will serve Christ and help to build his Kingdom.

In the evening of our lives we will be judged on love.
