

First Reading: Isaiah 40: 1-11

Comfort, O comfort my people,
says your God.
Speak tenderly to Jerusalem,
and cry to her
that she has served her term,
that her penalty is paid,

"In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God.

Every valley shall be lifted up,

and every mountain and hill be made low;

Gospel reading: Mark 1: 1-8

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you,

who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight,""

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Reflection from Suzy

Have you ever travelled up a mountain road that is just constant S bends? Did it have a terrifying drop at one side too? I have vivid memories of being driven on a slightly slushy road by my parents and the road became a series of switchbacks; the drop on the driver's side was terrifying. We all prayed the whole time that we wouldn't meet another car coming the other way because we didn't want to get too close to the drop. Climbing into the mountains a fine mist descended making visibility worse and worse until we could barely see to the end of the headlights and my Dad was almost guessing which way the road was going to go. There was a tense and tetchy atmosphere inside that car, nerves were jumping and we all wanted to blame someone else for us being in that precarious situation. Thankfully, we arrived safely at the top of the pass and proceeded to gently descend out of the mist – suddenly it cleared. In one of those glorious moments. The car emerged from the mist and the sun was blazing down and the valley was spread out below us with a wide and smooth and beautiful drive down into it. Joy and relief all round – we had made it.

Whenever I hear this passage "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight," I remember that journey up the mountain with its endless bends and terrifying drop. Some of us live our lives like that don't we. We live on adrenalin with a constant fear of the unknown future before us. The insecurity of doubt dogs our progress. We doubt our own abilities, we lack confidence in there being a positive outcome, we fear plunging down in free fall into a mire of failure, loss of image, loss of respect, loss of income, loss of employment, loss... There are terrifying statistics about the number of people who are living on anti-depressants and those numbers have been rising as people struggle with mental health issues during this difficult year.

John the baptizer came to people who were plagued by doubts and fears. People who were struggling to live up to other people's expectations and knew themselves to be unable to meet the strict standards required by the Law. People who were worried about the mistakes they made and frightened of the consequences of failure. John's message was like that moment when we emerge into the glorious sunshine and see the whole beautiful creation spread out before us. He brought them hope and swept away the insecurities and fears. John promised them that God would forgive them if they turned away from sin, turned away from all the idols of love of money, ambition, desire to keep up appearances and impress the neighbours and repented. He asked that they repent and ask for forgiveness and promised in return a new life with God in the bright light of God's love and support.

When the weight of insecurity, doubt and fear is lifted the road becomes so much smoother and brighter. As Christians we can be the heralds of good news. We are called to make the paths straight for ourselves and those around us and enable people to encounter Jesus and receive that transformational forgiveness and lightening of burdens. Once you walk with the Lord it becomes possible to imagine that there is a bright creation spread out before you. A straight and smooth path leading into a hope filled future. As Christians we are called to affirm others, to be positive and energising, we can pass on God's love and remind people that they are precious and have value and worth regardless of economic levels or work related success or material 'image'. In the social media driven world of the future we can remove the adrenalin fuelled fearful stress of

people's lives by bringing a reassuring, loving message of guaranteed acceptance and loving welcome. We will serve God by 'making the paths straight for the Lord' and helping people to find their way into the light of Christ. As it said in our reading from Philippians 2:15 a few weeks ago, 'shine among them like stars in the sky as you hold firmly to the word of life.' This Advent instead of dwelling on the sins we need to repent, let us help others to see the stars and find their way into the light.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe and trust in the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit,
the holy catholic Church,
the communion of saints,
the forgiveness of sins,
the resurrection of the body,
and the life everlasting. Amen.

Aware of how little we can do in our own strength, we offer these needs to the Lord of all the world.

Let us pray for those around us and those we know who are suffering from the effects of the pandemic, whether directly through illness, through bereavement or loneliness or anxiety about employment, education or future prospects. Help us all to hold on to the promise of this Advent season, both the immediacy of celebrating afresh the gift of Christ who came to live among us and the glory of things to come.

Lord hear us: Lord graciously hear us.

Lord, grant us a glimpse of your glory. Open our eyes to your coming to us, that we may know you are with us always, and that you are a very present help in trouble. Lord, as you abide in us and we abide in you, may we show traces of your glory in our lives, and so glorify you, Lord Jesus, who lives and reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**
