First Reading: Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied - altogether there were about twelve of them.

Gospel reading: Mark 1: 4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Reflection from Mavis Nevill

I was always glad that when the reordering of St Saviour's was planned, the Baptism Font continued to be positioned at the back of church, adjacent to the entrance. This is the traditional placing for fonts, as a sign that the sacrament of Baptism is the beginning of our journey of faith.

Baptism speaks of a washing clean from that which is worldly and which would drag us down, that which is sin and sinful. This is true, whether our parents and Godparents initially made the faith commitment for us, or whether we came to faith as an adult.

Thus washed, the baptised Christian is free to live a "new life" in Christ Jesus; to have a new beginning.

This ritual cleansing from sin and the sinful, was also part of Jewish religious rites and was a requirement for those who converted to the Jewish faith. It was also part of the Temple tradition and it is believed that the Temple, in Jesus's time, had four ritual baths for this purpose.

The Jews thus had an established ritual for repentance and cleansing. Then John bursts onto the scene, in his strange prophetic garb and his hell fire preaching. Large crowds who went out to listen to him, did repent and were baptised in the River Jordan. We can see that would have been a direct challenge to the religious authorities in Jerusalem, even before they heard a word of his condemnation of the powers that be.

However, even though many of John's hearers did indeed commit themselves to make a new start, we may well ask, "but why did Jesus go to John the Baptist to be baptised by him?"

St Matthew's Gospel account of this story has John the Baptist asking Jesus that same question. "Why do you come to be baptised by me?" He asked that question because, of all those hundreds who flocked to the River Jordan, to be

baptised by him, when it came to Jesus's turn, he recognised that this man was different. He discerned that this man might well be the promised Messiah he had been preaching about. This might be the one whose sandals he would not feel fit to undo, and who would be one who would baptise, not with water, but with the Holy Spirit.

It is Jesus's answer that is interesting for us, as one translation puts it; "I've come because it is the right thing to do." Jesus's answer to John's reveals something very profound about his character. Obviously Jesus believed that submitting to John's Baptism was what God wanted of him.

It is interesting, that as Baptism is the beginning of our Christian journey, so Jesus's Baptism, by John, marked the beginning of his ministry. It the time when Jesus leaves his life as a carpenter and builder of Nazareth behind, and dedicates himself entirely to his ministry of teaching and healing - working for the coming of God's Kingdom.

Jesus's baptism served another purpose. John the Baptist identified his mission, as preparing the way for the one who would come after him. The one who would not baptise his followers with water, but rather with the Holy Spirit of God. John had also been given an inner assurance that he would recognise who that was, when he baptised him.

So the baptism of Jesus was a setting of the stage. A marker post of a new thing that was happening. Jesus came to preach that the Kingdom of God is here!

Our baptism is also a marker of something new breaking in. We are baptised in response to the command of Jesus, to his disciples, after the resurrection, that they should go into all the world, spreading the Good News, and baptising converts into the Kingdom of God.

In our own baptisms we are initiated as members of that Kingdom, we are identified as sons and daughters of God. We are also anointed with the Holy Spirit by the act of baptism.

Let us praise God for the knowledge that we are God's children. It is the most precious truth of Christianity. Let us also praise God that we have been drenched in God's Holy Spirit at our baptism, and we can experience the truth of this in ever deepening ways. In this further period of Covid lockdown, at a time when our contact with others is extremely limited, we need, more than ever, the knowledge, that God is with us. We also need to be alert to the gentle whispers of the Holy Spirit, as to ways we can spread the knowledge of the Kingdom and the joy that knowledge gives us, in these difficult days. So many folk are feeling lonely, frightened and unloved at this time. We need to seek real wisdom as a church, and as individuals, as to ways to respond to that need.

Jesus submitted to being baptised, because he thought it was the right thing to do. We need to use these difficult times to attune the ears of our hearts to, what is the right thing for us to do.

May God bless us all at this time.
